



Small class sizes

Benefit from small classes capped at a maximum of 8 students (aged 13+) or 15 students (aged 9-12). Tutorials are also part of the offering to students aged 16+ and are two students to one tutor. Academic Overview

The course is an intensive learning experience, focused on giving you the opportunity to examine your subject deeply and to explore your own ideas in a supportive small-class environment.



9-12

Your lessons are designed to get you to think and learn in a fun and interactive way. Our highly experienced teachers are looking forward to meeting you. There are no wrong answers and no silly questions, in fact we would actively encourage you to engage in as much class discussion as possible around your subject - it's a great way to learn more. You will have lessons on four mornings each week in a class of no more than 15 students. There will be breaks each hour to ensure you can maintain your focus and get the most out of your lesson time.

Each day your tutor will set you a short piece of work for you to complete on your own, staff will be available during supervised homework sessions to answer questions.

13-15

Four days per week you will have a subject lesson with your tutor. This is a taught session in a small group and it will be very interactive. It will last three hours, with a short break around half way through.

Your tutor will want to hear what you think about the topics being discussed, and to get the most out of these sessions you should come

ready to express your ideas and take part in discussions. There are no wrong answers and no stupid questions.

Your tutor will set you work to do on your own between subject lessons. This may include completing some set reading, answering a set of problems, or producing a piece of written work. To get the most out of the course, you must be prepared to put in as much effort outside the classroom as you do in it.

There will be one masterclass each week led by the course staff, with students from all different subject areas. These are an opportunity to learn about and practise personal skills like resilience, problem solving, and communication that will help you in your academic journey.

16-17 and 18-24

On Mondays, Tuesdays, and Fridays you will have a seminar with your tutor. This is a taught session in a small group and it will be very interactive. It will last three hours, with a short break around half-way through. Your tutor will want to hear what you think about the topics being discussed, and to get the most out of these sessions you should come ready to express your ideas and take part in discussions. There are no wrong answers and no stupid questions.

On Thursdays you have a tutorial. A tutorial is a one-hour class either individually or in a pair with an expert in your chosen subject and which centres on a review of the piece of work you have produced on Wednesday. Tutorials are a key feature of the teaching model used at the University of Oxford.

Every tutorial is different and personalised to individual students, but typically consists of three core features: the tutor gives a thorough assessment and in depth feedback on work that the student has prepared in advance; the tutor challenges the student to consider alternative ideas or counter-arguments, stretching the student further than the work they have prepared already has; and finally the student is able to ask questions of the tutor, and pursue the topics that are of most interest to them. This is what makes the tutorial method so effective. The direction of the tutorial can be influenced by both the tutor and the student and as a result each individual session is a unique class. Often being paired with another student allows the tutor to encourage you to appreciate counter arguments in the other student's work.



In addition to the core academic sessions, there are also age specific sessions, workshops and learning opportunities built into each programme, please see the draft timetables at the end of this brochure for more information.

During your course you will stay at either Harrow School, St John's Beaumont or Eton, all well-renowned and highly respected schools around London. No matter where you are staying, you will be housed in the same accommodation enjoyed by term-time students.

Harrow School


Harrow School was founded in 1572 by John Lyon, a local landowner and farmer, under a Royal Charter of Queen Elizabeth I. Former students include seven past UK Prime Ministers, including Winston Churchill as well as Hollywood stars, like Benedict Cumberbatch. The school was also used in the filming of Harry Potter. It is located in Greater London on a hill overlooking the city and Harrow on the Hill is the closest underground station.

You and your new friends will stay in either the girls' or the boys' dormitory, both of which have shared bathroom facilities. Despite its age, each classroom has been fitted with modern technology.

St John's Beaumont, Windsor

St John's Beaumont designed by the architect John Francs Bentley was founded in 1888, it is designed in a Tudor style which provides the quintessentially British boarding school look and feel. This unique site is far enough away from London to enjoy the peace and quiet of the countryside, while close enough to make day trips an enjoyable experience.

There are still many original features in use, such as the individual student dormitory "cubbies". You and your new friends will stay in either the girls' or the boys' dormitory, both of which have shared bathroom facilities.



The classrooms boast a mix of historic importance and modern technology, making them a great space for learning. The site also features a music room, sports hall and arts room, where students can engage in all the extracurricular activities our social and cultural programme has to offer.

Eton College (12 year old students only)

Eton College was established in 1440 by Henry VI under the provisions of providing free education to 70 boys who could then progress to further education. Set in the outskirts of Windsor, Eton is regarded as one of the most prestigious public schools in the world. Twenty previous students at Eton (or "Old Etonians") have gone on to become British Prime Ministers. With architecture ranging from late Gothic through Neoclassical and Edwardian and beyond, the buildings and grounds of Eton College are a joy to behold.

ACCOMMODATION BY AGE

Students (aged 13+)

The University of Oxford is a world-leading centre of learning, teaching and research and the oldest university in the English-speaking world. The University of Cambridge has a lot of exciting and interesting history to offer, particularly in an academic context. There have been 121 Nobel Prize affiliates from the University of Cambridge. Whether you choose Oxford or Cambridge, you

will have the opportunity to study in a variety of classrooms where the undergraduate and postgraduate students research, hypothesise and learn each year. These may be in an old part of the college, dating back to the 16th century, or in a modern part of the college with slightly more up to date features. Either way, you will be learning in a truly academically inclined environment with expert tutors.

13-15 OXFORD

During your course you will stay at either Lady Margaret Hall or Gradel Quad in New College, both beautiful and historic University of Oxford locations.

Lady Margaret Hall

Located in leafy north Oxford, Lady Margaret Hall, or 'LMH' as it is often known, was founded in 1878 as one of the first women's colleges in the university.

New College

Contrary to its name it is one of the oldest colleges in Oxford. Innovative in its design it boasted the first enclosed quadrangle completed in 1386. You will live, eat and study in the newly refurbished Gradel Quad.



13-15 CAMBRIDGE

During your course you will stay at Fitzwilliam College.

Fitzwilliam College

One of the University of Cambridge's most dynamic and international colleges. Located north-west of Cambridge, Fitzwilliam, or 'Fitz' as it is often known, was founded in 1869 and is a forward-looking college that has won many awards for its fantastic buildings. At Fitzwilliam you will use the university classrooms and stay in student accommodation.



ACCOMMODATION BY AGE

16-17 OXFORD

During your course you will stay at either Somerville College or Worcester College.

Somerville College

With a large green central quadrangle, Somerville was founded in 1879 as one of the first women's colleges in the university.

Worcester College

The college was founded in 1714 and boasts classic eighteenth century and medieval buildings along with modern state of the art facilities.



16-17 CAMBRIDGE

During your course you will stay at Sidney Sussex College.

Sidney Sussex College

This is of the University of Cambridge's smaller and unique colleges. Located in the historic heart of Cambridge, the college is known for its warm and diverse community and was founded by the Countess of Sussex in 1596



18-24 OXFORD

During your course you will stay at Worcester College (see above).



18-24 CAMBRIDGE

During your course you will stay at Corpus Christi college.

Corpus Christi

This college was founded in 1352 and is located in the heart of Cambridge. One of its many beautiful features is the Corpus clock, a unique clock which operates with no numbers or hands, a must see.




What's included?

The cost of the Four-Week Enhanced course starts at £12,790 and includes everything included in a standard two week summer course, PLUS:

- Complimentary transport between course locations
- Additional meals and accommodation for the four week period
- Extra weekend activities, such as a theatre show and other historical site visits as added value for extending your course.







Airport Travel and Transfers

Once you have confirmed your place, you will be asked to complete a travel form advising us of your plans for arrival and departure. This will be your opportunity to book your complimentary transfer. If you prefer to make your own arrangements, this is absolutely fine.

Travelling as an unaccompanied minor

We offer an unaccompanied minor service for students registered as an unaccompanied minor with the airline. This service is complimentary for arrivals and costs £145 for departures. When arriving as a registered unaccompanied minor, students will be escorted through the airport by the airlines' staff before being collected by our team in the arrivals hall. For departures, students will travel to the airport and be met by the 'unaccompanied minors' supervisor who will help students with the check in process, and ensure they are safely handed over to the care of the airline's designated staff member.

Please contact the airline directly to confirm whether the unaccompanied minor service is necessary for your journey. Keep in mind that each airline may have different age requirements for this service. Most airlines will charge a fee for the unaccompanied minor service. All airlines require the details of who will be collecting and dropping off students, to be shared with them ahead of time. We will provide this information to you no later than 4 weeks prior to your course start date. You can only book our unaccompanied minor service on the Travel Form.



Applying for a Visa

Please note that we are unable to assist in the application process for visas, however we will support you with information and a supporting document.

To check if you need a visa, follow the steps below.



STEP 01

Head to the UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) and British Government website

STEP 02

Enter your nationality as per your passport

STEP 03

Select your reason for coming to the UK as 'Study'

STEP 04

Select 6 months or less for the duration of your stay in the UK (as our courses run for less than 6 months)

Click here

You will then be told if you require a visa. You can apply for your visa no sooner than 3 months before your entry to the UK (your course start date). It typically takes around 3 weeks for you to hear back from UKVI regarding your application, we advise applying as soon as you can!

You will need to prove the following in your visa application

- That you'll leave the UK at the end of your visit.
- That you'll not live in the UK for extended periods through frequent or successive visits, or make the UK your main home.
- That you're able to support yourself during your trip (or have funding from someone else to support you) please see Proof of Funds section.
- That you're able to pay for your return or onward journey (or have funding from someone else to pay for the journey).
- You have proof of any business or other activities you want to do in the UK, as allowed by the Visitor Rules (included in this is study under 6 months).

Oxford Summer Courses will provide you with

 A Visa Support Letter to say you've been accepted onto a course of no more than 6 months provided by an accredited UK institution.

Additionally, if you're aged 9-17 you'll need to provide the following

· You must have written consent from your parent or

guardian to travel to the UK and written consent from your parent/guardian for you to stay with Oxford Summer Courses while you're in the UK.

If you're aged 9-17 Oxford Summer Courses will provide you with the following required information

- Provide proof that you have somewhere suitable to live during your stay in the UK, including the name and date of birth of the person that they will be staying with (Course Director or Oxford Summer Courses Head Office team member).
- An Offer Letter.
- The address where you will be living.
- Details of our relationship to the person who'll be looking after you.

Electronic Visa Waiver (EVW)

- If you are from the following countries, you may wish to apply for an Electronic Visa Waiver (EVW):
 - Bahrain
- Kuwait
- Oman
- Qatar
- Saudi Arabia
- United Arab Emirates
- EVW's are easier to apply for, cheaper and normally returned quicker than a Standard Visitor Visa.
- You can apply online from 3 months before the start of your course for you EVW: if you change course dates you must apply for a new EVW.



Documentation for arriving in the UK

You're required to carry certain documents with you when you travel to the UK, and you could be required to present these at immigration. These documents are required whether you're visa exempt, on a short term visitor visa or an EVW.

You will need to provide evidence of

- Proof of funds to support yourself whilst staying in the UK.
- Proof of intent to leave the country (e.g. your flight ticket home).
- Oxford Summer Courses will provide you with the evidence of the address of where you'll be staying in the UK.
- Your course acceptance letter.
- If you're under 18 and traveling alone you will need to provide evidence of written consent from your parent allowing you to travel alone, including your parent's contact details and home address.
- The address and person who will be looking after you during your stay (we will provide this) and written parental permission for this person to look after you.
- It is a requirement by law that you don't use the epassport gates: you must get a stamp in your passport

Proof of funds

In accordance with government guidelines, you must be able to prove that you can support yourself financially during your stay in the UK. This includes:

- You must be able to maintain and accommodate yourself adequately without receiving public funds.
- You must have purchased a return journey or have proof of funds to pay for a return journey.
- Your full course fees must have been paid in full, OR, the student must have proof of funds to cover the remaining course fees.

As you can only apply for your visa from 3 months before your arrival date (course start date) and our balance deadline is due 90 days before the course start date, we advise waiting until your balance has been paid before you apply for your visa. Our Visa Support Letter is timed to be sent out once the balance has been paid and the balance deadline has passed. This ensures the letter shows you have paid for the course in full, and therefore strengthens your visa application!

What happens if your visa is rejected?

Please note that as explained and agreed to in our terms and conditions, it is the student's (and/or parent's or guardian's) responsibility to successfully apply for and secure a visa in order to attend your course with us. Therefore, if your visa is rejected you're not eligible for a refund, as agreed to in our terms and conditions. The insurance included in your course does not cover visa rejections.

We will discuss your case with you at the time as to how we can plan the next steps.

Timetable Definitions 2024

Academic Contact Time

Lesson (Ages 9-12)

Four days per week, you will have three lessons with your tutor in your chosen subject.

They will help you to explore your subject in an interactive way, with up to 14 other students.

Lesson (Ages 13-15)

Four days per week, you will have two lessons with your tutor in your chosen subject. They will help you to explore your subject in an interactive way, with up to 7 other students.

Seminar (Ages 16-17 and 18-24)

In your seminar your tutor will lead you through the subject in a collaborative and interactive way, encouraging critical thinking. This will be with up to 7 other students.

Tutorial (Ages 16-17 and 18-24)

Based on the Oxford tutorial teaching model, your tutorial is an opportunity to discuss your work and learn in a small group setting (1-2 students) from your expert tutor. You will receive personalised feedback from your tutor during this session.

Other Academic Time

Homework (supervised) (Ages 9-12)

You will have a set time to work on the homework set in your lessons. Our course staff will supervise this and be on hand to answer any general questions you may have.

Directed study (Ages 13-15)

You will have a set time to work on the homework set in your lessons. Our on course staff will be on hand to answer any general questions you may have.

Study (Ages 16-17)

This is time for you to explore the topic beyond your seminars and develop your own ideas. You might want to use this time to read around the subject (for relevant academic subjects), do your own research, prepare for your seminar, or do additional work to prepare for your tutorial. Your tutor will provide guidance on how to approach this.

Independent study (Ages 18-24)

This is time for you to explore the topic beyond your seminars and develop your own ideas. You might want to use this time to read around the subject (for relevant academic subjects), do your own research, prepare for your seminar, or do additional work to prepare for your tutorial.

Tutorial work (Ages 16-17 and 18-24)

You will have one tutorial each week with your tutor and will be set work in advance of it. This is time to specifically work towards preparing for your tutorial, with a set

deadline of 3pm on Wednesday to submit a piece of work.

Tutorial Q&A (Ages 16-17 and 18-24)

Find out what a tutorial is and understand how they contribute to the Oxford and Cambridge (called "supervisions" in Cambridge) learning model. You'll also have a time to ask questions to on- course staff ahead of your tutorial.

Curriculum Enrichment

Masterclass (Ages 13-15)

Learn life skills such as teamwork, debating, and collaboration from your on course staff team in an interactive workshop.

Goal setting (Ages 13-15)

Our course staff will support you in thinking about what you would like to get out of your time with Oxford Summer Courses and your future aspirations, so that you can set yourself stretching goals.

College visits (Ages 16-17 and 18-24)

An opportunity to visit a different Oxford or Cambridge college.

Future pathways (Ages 16-17 and 18-24)

Think about your future career and learn about how to get ahead in industry, from an expert speaker. By the end of this session you will have had an opportunity to think about your own future pathway.

Academic skills masterclass (Ages 16-17)

Skills-based workshop with students from all different subjects. This will help you to develop critical thinking skills and other academic skills to prepare you for university or your future endeavours.

Industry insight (18-24)

A discussion with experts across different industries. Learn more about a range of career and academic pathways and have an opportunity to ask questions.

Goal setting (Ages 16-17 and 18-24)

Our course staff will support you in thinking about what you would like to get out of your time with Oxford Summer Courses and your future aspirations, so that you can set yourself stretching goals.

University fair (Oxford only) (Ages 16-17)

Meet and ask questions to representatives of universities in the UK and beyond - find out what it takes to successfully apply to these universities.

Reflection

Time to reflect on the day's lessons and activities, facilitated by our course staff.

Social and Cultural Time

Activities / House Activities (Ages 9-12)

Planned activities from our course staff which can be on school grounds or in the local area. Some examples of these are sports, games, crafts, or an organised event at the school.

Activities (Ages 13+)

Planned activities from our course staff which can be on college grounds or in the city. Some examples of these are sports games, a local visit, or an organised event at the college.

Excursion

A trip off-site with your classmates, normally for a full day.

City tour and orientation (Ages 13+)

Orientation of your city - our course staff will show you round the 'best bits' of the city you are staying in to help you get your bearings.

Explore (Ages 13-15)

Supervised time to explore the city in groups.

Free time (Ages 16-17 and 18-24)

Free time to explore the city or organise your own activities with your classmates.

Graduation

An opportunity to celebrate your achievements on the course with your classmates and formally finish your time with Oxford Summer Courses.

Disco (Ages 9-12)

Celebrate the end of your course with your new friends!

Formal (Ages 13+)

A more formal dinner in your college or school, with table service and three courses of food. Many students choose to dress more smartly for this meal.

Bop (Ages 13+)

The Oxford and Cambridge name for a party or disco!

Evening social (Ages 18-24)

A chance to socialise with your classmates over a drink.

Practicalities

Arrivals

You'll arrive at your school/college site during this time. Our course staff will be available to greet you and show you to your room.

Welcome talk

Meet the Oxford Summer Courses staff who will be looking after you during your stay with us and hear the essential information about your course.

Packing / Unpacking (Ages 9-12)

Time to unpack your things at the start of the course and pack ready to leave at the end of the course.

Chats and bedtime (Ages 9-12)

A chance to chat to your house parent and friends before winding down for bed.

Room checks (Ages 9-12)

A necessary procedure in line with government policies to ensure our students are safe and well during our courses.

Getting ready (Ages 9-12)

This is time set aside for you to put on your best clothes ready for the Graduation!

Morning sign in (Ages 18-24)

Sign in with your course staff ahead of the day's events to find out any updates or useful information.

Meals and Breaks

Meals (Ages 9-12)

All our juniors sites are full-board, meaning you will have breakfast, lunch, and dinner provided by the school. On excursion day, this will be a packed lunch.

Meals (Ages 13-15)

All our 13-15 sites are full-board, meaning you will have breakfast, lunch, and dinner provided by the college. Colleges will provide a packed lunch on excursion days. There may be some unique dining experiences such as a BBQ or external restaurant meal depending on the site.

Meals (Ages 16-17 and 18-24)


